The Howard County Autism Society 10th annual autism walk and 5K running race, One Step Closer will be held on Saturday, Oct. 1, at Centennial Park in Ellicott City.

The event features a timed 5K run around Centennial Lake, a Lake Walk of the same distance and a shorter three-quarter mile Piece of Cake Walk. Who are the performers? We have 15 performers who take on various roles as characters and behind the scenes support. All of our members are volunteers and have full-time jobs and families in addition to the time they generously give to rehearsals and performances.

Do you get to choose your character? Yes. And many of our performers have more than one character they can choose from depending on the show.

Where do you get the costumes? They are all custom creations. We rely on the talents of our members and trusted crafters around the world to bring our characters to life.

What types of events do you attend? We are dedicated to community and charity events. Our events range from something as large as Star Wars Day at the Washington Nationals to an intimate hospital visit to cheer up an ill child.

What reactions do you get from kids and adults to your performances? Star Wars resonates with all walks of life; it never ceases to amaze us. Darth Maul is a bit of a rock star--we frequently have crowds chanting for him. Everyone loves a bad guy. We also never ever tire of hearing, "That's a girl Jedi!"
